Student wins business competition for business idea tailored to autistic children

Gateway Technical College student Beth Tyykila's entrepreneurial concept

for a "sensory palace" business focused on providing a fun atmosphere tailored

to the needs of autistic children won first place in the college's second annual

"Shark Tank"-like competition held Nov. 20 during the celebration of Global

Entrepreneurship Week.

Gateway's version of the Shark Tank mimics the TV show, in that students

pitch their idea for a business or an invention to a panel of judges. Prizes were

awarded to the top participants, and a free one-on-one business coaching

session was available to all participants prior to the event.

"It was a great experience, several people on the panel said they like the

idea and I should run with it," said Tyykila, of Racine. "It was a real

encouragement to me."

Tyykila came up with the idea for the sensory palace – filled with rooms

that stimulate all five of the human senses – after talking to parents of autistic

children who wanted to set up a sensory room at their home but could not afford

it. The business provides a more affordable and place for autistic children to have fun and engage in activities tailored to themselves and their families.

Tyykila won a Samsung Galaxy Tab 3 as well as a trophy for her winning proposal.

Other proposal winners included:

Second place, Goeff Clay, Racine. Proposal: Cordpak, which replaces the battery pack in a cordless power tool with an adapter that allows the user to run the tool off of a standard electrical outlet. Clay won a trophy and a \$100 Gateway Workforce and Economic Development Division professional development gift certificate.

Third place, Tania Cruz, Racine. Proposal: A Christian bookstore for Racine that offers Spanish literature, apparel, costumes, movies, and much more to Spanish-speaking Christians. Cruz won a \$25 gift card to a local bookstore.

Fourth place, Mavra Papadatos, Kenosha. Proposal: Mavra's Greek Olive Oil, which imports extra virgin olive oil from Greece grown on her family's farm, a tradition they've done for more than 100 years. Papadatos won a \$25 Yardarm gift certificate.

Fifth place, Chris LaLonde, Union Grove. Proposal: Rent a Nerd, which offers mobile computer assistance with an emphasis on education for senior citizens. LaLonde won a \$25 Yardarm gift certificate.

Sixth place, Allison Viesca, Racine. Proposal: Restaurant startup that features her unique spaghetti sauce. Viesca won a \$25 Yardarm gift certificate.
