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Gateway begins Fall 2009 semester with increased enrollment, opportunities

Gateway Technical College opened its Fall 2009 semester with greatly increased enrollment and new career opportunities.

The college's enrollment jumped by 17 percent in its full-time equivalent student numbers compared to last year for the three-county district of Kenosha, Racine and Walworth counties.

"In a changing economy, education is often viewed as the pathway to opportunity," said Gateway Technical College President Bryan Albrecht. "We are encouraged by the increased service we are able to provide to the citizens of Racine, Kenosha and Walworth counties."

Gateway continues to work on initiatives to grow "green career" programs in geothermal technology and wind energy; has expanded its engineering technology program offerings to include a new Fresh Water Resources degree; and continues to offer a new agreement with UW-Parkside which allows a block of 30 approved general education credits to be transferred from Gateway to the four-year college.

A new Health Wing opened on the Elkhorn Campus this semester, ground was broken last month on an Advanced Propulsion training addition to the Horizon Center for Transportation Technology in Kenosha and two new labs – welding and industrial mechanical technician – will provide opportunities for students on the Racine Campus.

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Gateway this semester continues to grow its "green" programs such as geothermal technology.

Gateway breaks ground on advanced transportation facility

Gateway broke ground on its 12,800-square-foot Advanced Propulsion Training addition to the Horizon Center for Transportation Technology, 4940-88th Ave., Kenosha, a project which will expand opportunities for Diesel Technology students and area employers.

The addition on the north side of the Horizon Center further elevates Gateway's position at the cutting edge of the transportation industry in Southeastern Wisconsin. The training done there will provide qualified technicians for the advanced diesel, diesel hybrid and alternative fuel industry.

"The addition is needed to expand Gateway programming in new areas of advanced propulsion, diesel and hybrid technology," Gateway Technical College President Bryan Albrecht said.

The addition is expected to be done in 2010 and in time for Fall 2010 courses. When the lab opens for classes in Fall 2010, it will house courses for the college's Diesel Technology programs, diesel diagnostics certification industry workshops and torque training for the wind industry.

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Putting the green in green practices

Gateway will offer another round of seminars to show businesses how to be more profitable through the use of green practices.

Seminars will benefit facility maintenance personnel and operations managers. Gateway is providing the seminars in response to business leaders asking for training in how to implement green practices into their everyday operations.

The first seminar, held September 17, provided an overview of how certain green changes can benefit a company. The next seminar, to be held October 15, is "The Building Envelope," which shows how design and operation of a building can conserve energy and provide a safe and healthy environment for employees.

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Gateway student places in top 20 in national floral design contest

Schnuell placed 19th overall, but placed seventh in the Napkin Ring category; 11th in Buffet Design; and 19th in Bridal Bouquet and Sweetheart Table.

Schnuell also was awarded two scholarships during the symposium. One was a \$1,500 Allen Shackelford AIFD Foundation Scholarship, another was a \$600 Koehler-Dramm Institute of Floristry Scholarship, to be used at the Koehler-Dramm Institute in Minneapolis.
