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#### WHAT IS THE GATEWAY TECHNICAL COLLEGE FOUNDATION?

Established in 1977, Gateway Technical College Foundation, Inc. is a non-profit, 501 (c)(3) organization, independent from Gateway Technical College and governed by a board of directors consisting of community-minded leaders from Kenosha, Racine and Walworth Counties.

#### WHY DOES GATEWAY NEED A FOUNDATION?

Although public funding supports many of Gateway's activities, the need for private support continues to grow. More and more young students face financial

hurdles in continuing their education. Additionally, the uncertain economy has increased enrollment of older, displaced workers who may be heads of household without a source of income. Right now, over 70% of Gateway's students are eligible for federal financial aid, which normally only covers a small percentage of a student's financial needs. The Foundation helps offset this burden by providing more than 100 scholarships to incoming and continuing students, as well as emergency grants when students face financial hardships. Unfortunately, the number of applicants and the needs are much greater than the Foundation's ability to help. That's why private donations are so critical.

### SCHOLARSHIP MEANS Staying in School

WITHIN TEN MINUTES OF MEETING MATT MARKHAM OF RACINE, one thing becomes very clear: his commitment and devotion to his wife and four young daughters influence every decision he makes.

"I was working a job that took me out of town a lot," Mark says. "I didn't want to be away from my family so much, so I took a different job. It was a pay cut, but it allowed me to spend more time with my family. It also offered a tuition program and the hours allowed me to go to school."

Matt had always wanted to return to school. He took some classes at Gateway in 2002, but didn't really know what he wanted to do. Then one day he struck up a conversation with a neighbor, who shared with Matt that he was a Gateway graduate who had subsequently graduated from Milwaukee School of Engineering. "I decided I wanted to do the same thing," Matt says.

Matt enrolled in Gateway's Electrical Engineering Technology and Biomedical Engineering programs and tried to balance work, school and family while making ends meet. "In order for me to support my family on a part-time salary, I needed to supplement my income in some way," Matt says. "I'd heard about scholarships offered through the Gateway Technical College Foundation so I went online and applied." Matt received the \$500 Katy Ganaway Memorial Scholarship.

Unfortunately, soon afterward the economy soured and Matt lost his job. The importance of the scholarship grew. Matt continued to go to school part-time while he applied for more than 100 jobs. With no employment prospects in sight and anxious to complete his degree, Matt decided to go from part-time student, to full-time student when the spring semester started.

Matt knows the sooner he completes his associate degree, the easier it will be to find a job. "This job market is very competitive," Matt says. "To compete I need an associate degree. Once I graduate, I'll be a lot more qualified."

Matt continues to look for work and go to school. He's enjoying the extra time he gets to spend with his daughters. "They're only little for a short period of time," Matt says. "I'm glad I can spend this time with them."

In the meantime, Matt has begun his Gateway Foundation online scholarship application for this academic year. "The scholarship has made a tremendous difference to me," Matt says. "We're just getting by. But without the Gateway Foundation scholarship, I wouldn't be able to stay in school."





# A DREAM REALIZED

FOR AS LONG AS SHE CAN REMEMBER, AMANDA WILLIAMS has wanted one thing. "When I was little and people asked me what I wanted to be when I grew up, I'd always say I wanted to be a nurse," Amanda says.

At the age of 12, Amanda got the chance to volunteer in the nursing home where her mother worked. Her experiences there, and later caring for her ailing grandmother, further fueled Amanda's desire to enter the nursing profession.

But things didn't go as Amanda planned. At age 17 she became pregnant. Amanda committed herself to graduating from high school, and with the help of a "motivating guidance counselor and some creative class scheduling," Amanda graduated from high school. On the day of her graduation, Amanda gave birth to a son.

As life took over, Amanda's dreams of becoming a nurse seemed to slip farther away. Raising children, working in a factory, and trying to make ends meet kept her from returning to school. But the desire never died. "I was always trying to figure out how to get back to school," she says.

program, she knew it was what she was looking for.

Coordinating her schedule with her children's activities, her husband's job, and her job as a CNA proved difficult, but not insurmountable. While she worked third shift and went to school during the day, her husband worked first or second shift while their children were in school.

Things seemed to fall nicely into place and Amanda was on her way to realizing her dream. Then, in early 2010, Amanda found herself facing yet another heartbreaking hurdle: her husband's job was eliminated. She worried about whether she would be able to continue her education.

Amanda had heard about the student emergency funds provided by Gateway Technical College Foundation. Through generous donations from individuals, Gateway staff and other organizations, Gateway students facing financial challenges can apply for vouchers to cover a portion of their tuition, books, or fees. Students facing transportation issues can obtain a gas card or a bus pass when they prove need.

Amanda applied for the funds and received money to help pay for a portion of her tuition and fees. "It sure helped us make ends meet," Amanda says. And it allowed her to stay in school.

This spring, Amanda expects to graduate with an LPN degree. But she's not finished. "I plan to go two more semesters to earn my RN," she says.

### SIMPLE TECHNOLOGY INSPIRES STUDENTS

IT'S BEEN SAID THAT ENGLISH IS ONE OF THE MOST difficult languages to master. But one Gateway Technical College English Language Learner (ELL) instructor, Elaine Asma, is utilizing simple technology to help her students become more proficient in our tricky tongue.

"My husband, a criminal investigator, came home with a digital voice recorder that he uses for work," Asma explains. "As my kids were playing with it I thought, 'This would be great in the classroom!""

Asma immediately bought one and took it to her students the next day. As her English-as-a-second-language students recorded themselves reading a passage in English, then listened to their own voices, they were able to more meaningfully self-identify where they needed improvement in pronunciation, cadence, inflection, and speed of speech.

"They were so good at self-analysis," Asma marvels. "Right then I knew I needed more recorders."

A coworker encouraged Asma to apply for an Inspiration Grant. Inspiration Grants, funded by Gateway Technical College Foundation, provide funding to students, faculty and staff for the development and implementation of high quality, innovative projects that support the Gateway mission.

At first Asma was concerned her request wasn't "high-tech enough." But she applied and was awarded funds to purchase 30 voice recorders, several battery chargers and 12 sets of rechargeable batteries.

The day she received word her grant was awarded, she bought the recorders and took them to her classroom. The first assignment for her students? Read the voice recorder instructions, in English, then figure out how to use them.

Asma's use of the recorders has grown even more creative. And though the recorders have only been used for a short time, she has already seen a number of successes. One of her Chinese-speaking students has improved her English dramatically after hearing herself add an "ah" sound between words. "Once she heard a recording of herself, she was able to work on eliminating the extra sounds," Asma says.

An added bonus of the recorders: the students genuinely enjoy the activity. "As soon as I bring out the recorders, the energy level in class goes way up," Asma says. Several students have even gone out and bought their own recorders so they can practice at home.

Asma plans to create specific lesson plans that incorporate the voice recorders, which will be a shared resource with other ELL instructors. And she's discovered that technology in the classroom doesn't have to be fancy to be effective. "Even the simple technology of these recorders has had an impact on my students," she says. "And as they become more proficient in English, they'll more easily transition into Gateway programs and, ultimately, careers."

### LONGTIME PARTNERSHIP STILL BENEFITTING STUDENTS

AS GATEWAY TECHNICAL COLLEGE MOVES TOWARD OUR 100-YEAR ANNIVERSARY, it's inspiring to note that one of our most enduring partnerships was forged a full half century ago. Snap-on Incorporated's relationship with Gateway Technical College began in the 1960s and continues to this day.

One of Gateway's core values is innovation and the College currently boasts four Advanced Technology Centers. It's at one of these centers – the Horizon Center for Transportation & Technology in Kenosha – that Snap-on's presence is most pronounced. The Snap-on flag flies in tandem with the Gateway flag and the interior walls display Snap-on signage, memorabilia, and corporate colors (red and black). Most importantly, the work bays are equipped with the most advanced Snap-on tools and equipment.

Brookhouse believes Gateway's focus on technology and innovation in the classroom sets a higher standard not achieved by many other schools. He sees a positive domino effect from this: well-trained students become more in-demand. When hired, they provide improved service, higher efficiency and greater productivity. This, in turn, improves business and creates consumer confidence.

Snap-on feels fortunate to partner with Gateway. "How lucky could Snap-on be?" Brookhouse asks. "To be able to advance education, build a strong workforce and support local students...could we be more fortunate to have this kind of impact on our community?"
