Exploring college and career options with high school students

Gateway hosts a number of events and opportunities throughout the year to help area students learn about career opportunities and the possibilities available to them by attending Gateway.

National Signing Day

February 21, 2020 marked National Career and Technical Education Signing Day, an event broadcast live from colleges across the United States commemorating high school seniors signing a letter of intent committing to a specific college. **179 high school students from 26 different high schools** signed their letters of intent to attend Gateway Technical College in Fall 2020.

Explore Gateway Tours

High school students have the opportunity to find out about Gateway career programs that interest them through **Explore Gateway Tours.** Students experience Gateway's cutting-edge career labs, meet program faculty and tour campus. Last year over 800 students attended six Explore Gateway Tours.

Yo Puedo College Day

Nearly 165 students attended **Yo Puedo** to explore career options, meet Latino college students, connect with college experts and learn about available resources.

Dual Credit Day

April 30, 2020 was **Dual Credit Day** in the State of Wisconsin. At Gateway Technical College, over 6,000 Transcripted Credit students received a Dual Credit t-shirt. Students were encouraged to wear it during our Dual Credit Day Competition for a chance to win, and our winner for Dual Credit Day was from Burlington High School!

In the high school graduating class of 2020, 324 Gateway credentials were earned by 313 unique students.

Grants Supporting High School Teachers & Students

In the 2019-2020 school year, Gateway received **a total \$897,146 in** grants to support area high school students and teachers.

Department of Workforce Development (DWD) Fast Forward Grant - Nursing Assistant and EMT

• **\$98,824** to train up to 420 high school students from eight school districts preparing students to earn Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA) or Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) certification credentials. The grant was extended to June 30, 2021.

Department of Workforce Development (DWD) Fast Forward Grant - Welding Academy

• **\$100,000** to prepare 34 high school students to earn up to 17 credits toward Gateway's Welding/Maintenance and Fabrication technical diploma, gain industry certifications, and participate in a Welding Youth Apprenticeship.

Department of Workforce Development (DWD) Dual Credit Teacher Training

• **\$290,000** to train 37 teachers minimum from seven school districts toward a teaching certification that meets Higher Learning Commission standards. 24 teachers have participated in the grant. The grant was extended to August 30, 2021.

Dream It. Do It.

• **\$17,350** Gateway worked with employers and K-12 partners to promote manufacturing careers and the image of manufacturing at nine high schools.

Career Prep and Perkins

• **\$44,926** supported Gateway, in collaboration with secondary schools, in developing Rigorous Programs of Study (RPOS) to support career and technical education students transitioning from a Wisconsin high school to a Wisconsin technical college.

Youth Apprenticeship

• **\$36,000** Youth Apprenticeship (YA) Grants created under 1999 Wisconsin Act 9 and administered by the Dept. of Workforce Development, are available to fund youth apprenticeship consortiums authorized under Wisconsin Statute 106.13. The purpose of the grant is to administer the statewide YA program to connect high school juniors and seniors to paid, on-the-job work experience and in school training in one of 11 career pathways.

Advanced Manufacturing & Early Childhood Education Career Pathways

• **\$183,983 Adv. Manufacturing & \$116,063 ECE** - These grants enable students to secure stackable industry credentials in Advanced Manufacturing or Early Childhood Education and advance to higher levels of education and employment in that area.

• **\$10,000** to support secondary students to prepare for and gain access to Gateway's manufacturing and engineering programs and careers.



Adult High School & HSED

Adult High School and HSED programs at Gateway are designed to help students attain a high school diploma or an equivalent degree. Our Adult High School program caters to students a few credits shy of completion by enabling them to make up missing coursework to earn a high school diploma, pending approval from their local high school district. **NOTE: The Adult High School Program will be discontinued at the end of the Spring 2021 semester.**

For those with fewer earned high school credits, the HSED program offers two options. After an initial Test of Adult Basic Education (TABE test), Gateway staff helps students develop a personalized educational plan to earn a credential equivalent to a high school diploma from the state Department of Public Instruction. Alternatively, **qualified** students may elect to enroll in a 5.09 HSED program, a state-approved competency-based curriculum designed and administered by Gateway staff to support either college-bound or work-force-bound students with personalized and small-group support to achieve education and career goals by earning an HSED.

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This school year, **21** students graduated from the Adult High School program, and **179** students graduated from the GED/HSED program with **52** graduates from the HSED 5.09 program at Racine Literacy Council and **39** graduates from the HSED 5.09 program at Racine Workforce.

Direct Enrollment to Gateway from High School
