ACADEMIC AFFAIRS (Matt Janisin)

Academic Operations

Open registration for Summer and Fall semesters has begun. Academic Operations and the scheduling office is responsible for building and producing the course section offerings for the district for each academic term. For the 24/25 academic year, this included 8552 course section deliveries and 1664 conflict free academic blocks.


Pre Run/Cancel for Summer 2024 will take place on April 17 & April 24, 2024, this effort is to help ensure schools look at the enrollment numbers of their section offerings and make appropriate decisions based on the College's efforts to best align section offerings with student demand. A variety of decisions may be completed during this time, including; canceling, stacking, pending, and tweaking section offerings. This process is also helpful with creating a final Run/Cancel meeting on April 29 that is efficient and productive.

Textbook selection for the 24/25 academic year closed in mid March. Follett is ordering and updating all textbook and supply information. Academic Operations is working on a RFP for the Campus Bookstores to ensure we are providing programs that help reduce textbook costs for students and ensure they have the textbook on the first day of class.

iMET Center

Gateway was invited to participate in the Society of Manufacturing Engineering (SME) Manufacturing Imperative - Workforce Pipeline Challenge along 24 other colleges. The kickoff meeting was held at the SC Johnson iMET Center on March 14, with the SME

team, Gateway faculty and staff, and industry partners. A report and strategic plan will be prepared and shared with our industry partners as we begin our work on this collaboration.

Women in Manufacturing Day 2024 was held at the SC Johnson iMET Center on March 22. This event brought in middle and high school students as well as other members of the community to meet with Gateway faculty and companies to learn about careers in manufacturing and skills trades.









School of Pre-College and Momentum Programs

The ELL Program teaches English to students who have come to Gateway from all parts of the world. Some of the countries represented are: China, Japan, Mexico, Ukraine, Honduras, Nicaragua, Columbia, Russia, Peru, Ecuador, Venezuela, Guatemala, and the Dominican Republic.

During the month of March, ELL students from Elkhorn, Kenosha, and Racine were able to take a field trip to the iMET Center to view the FAB lab.

Four STEM Scholars are on schedule to graduate at the end of the Spring 2024 semester. Two additional scholars are scheduled to graduate at the end of the Summer 2024 semester. STEM Scholars Coordinator, Sabrina Morgan is working closely with each student on their transfer to the 4 year partner institution.

School of Business and Transportation

Steve McNaughton, Greg Patchel and Craig Czerwinski attended the Redbird Migration 2024 conference where flight training professionals attend presentations from a wide range of industry leaders and small group breakout sessions tailored to meet the goals of attendees. Migration provides solutions to the real-world problems facing flight training organizations, flight instructors, K-12 aviation educators, and their students.

School of Health

The School of Health recently held its 3rd annual Interprofessional Simulation Event on 3/16/24. Multiple programs across School of Health and School of Protective and Human Service participated in the event and also included representation from Flight for Life and Racine Fire Department.

The School of Health nursing program is now recognized as a continuing education provider for the Wisconsin Nurses Association.


There has been a continued expansion of the Nursing Assistant program contract for services sections. There's a significant need from our high school partners, including rural schools and out of district schools.




















The IT program faculty and academic advisors met on March 1 at Burlington Center to discuss curriculum, enrollment and other related issues.

High School Partnerships

The High School Partnerships Team was busy in March connecting with students, high school partners, legislators, and the community, demonstrating our dedication to supporting student success and fostering opportunities for educational advancement. Dual Credit Registrations:

- Successfully wrapped up 99% of dual credit registrations for the 2023-2024 school year.
- Projecting a significant increase in unique students, with a projected count of 7,610 compared to last year's 7,322, showcasing the department's growth and impact.

High School Counselor Lunch N Learn (March 5th):

- Hosted a successful High School Counselor Lunch N Learn event covering crucial agenda topics.
- Agenda topics included updates on the gateway program, Aurora business partnership, Gateway promise, dual credit opportunities, as well as updates on NSS (New Student Services) and FAFSA.

Presentation at Badger High School Board Meeting (March 11th):

- Presented at the Badger High School Board Meeting, highlighting Badger's strong commitment to dual credit programs.
- Emphasized the significant positive impacts of dual credit programs on students' academic and career pathways.

Youth Apprenticeship Day at the Capitol (March 13th):

- Participated in Youth Apprenticeship Day at the Capitol in collaboration with Elkhorn Area School District.
- Students engaged with local representatives, sharing personal stories on how Youth Apprenticeship programs are positively impacting their lives and futures.

Gateway Edge Info Session (March 14th):

 Attended the Gateway Edge Info Session at the Elkhorn Campus, actively participating in promoting and recruiting for cohort 2 of the program.

Program Effectiveness

On 03/06/24, the Civil Engineering programs hosted an orientation session for the new Business and Industry Leadership Team (BILT) model being piloted through a national project with the Center for Occupational Research and Development (CORD). Fifteen local employers joined the virtual call to learn more about the model and a meeting scheduled for 04/05/24 to review necessary knowledge, skills and abilities (KSA's) for the program area. Employers had an opportunity to engage with faculty and academic leadership and to pledge their commitment to the new employer engagement model.

On 03/19/24, the faculty and dean subgroup of the college's Student Assessment Committee met to finalize a new assessment plan and process, which will be implemented beginning with the 2025-26 academic year assessment cycle. Participants also reviewed a tentative communication and implementation plan which will be launched in 2024-25 to help faculty understand the need for a new assessment plan and process and its projected impact on student and program success.

On 03/27/24, the Director of Academic Excellence submitted the Concept Review and Program Approval packets to WTCS requesting approval for a new Dental Hygiene associate degree. The program is expected to be approved at the next WTCS Board meeting on 05/21/24. Shortly after the program approval is received in May, a team of college experts will convene to establish the program implementation plan and timeline.

Institutional Research

The 2022-23 Graduate Outcomes Survey is now complete and the results are available on this public <u>dashboard</u>. This year's results revealed a 92% employment rate, with 72% employed in jobs related to their degree. Among graduates who are employed full time, the median annual salary is \$59,055. Overall, satisfaction was high with 93% of graduates reporting they were satisfied or very satisfied with their training at Gateway. Check out the <u>dashboard</u> to learn more.

Grants Office

Gateway has been awarded all grants the college applied for through WTCS for 2024-25. These grants include 5 competitive State grant awards: 1 Developing Markets grant for Respiratory Therapy, 2 Career Pathway grants for Human and Protective Services and Uniquely Abled Adults, 1 Core Industry grant for HVAC, and 1 Completion grant for the Men of Color program. Gateway was also awarded the following formula-based grants: 1 Professional Growth grant, an Adult Education and Family Literacy grant, and 6 Perkins grants.

In March, the Grants Office worked with the School of Health to submit the Dental Hygiene grant application. The Grants Office additionally worked with the High School Partnerships department to submit a Department of Workforce Development Youth Apprenticeship grant as well as a State of Wisconsin Allied Health Professional Education and Training grant for Gateway's Nursing Assistant Dual Credit program.

Organizational Excellence

The Spring 2024 IPEDS surveys and the annual Higher Learning Commission financial and non-financial surveys have been completed. Organizational Excellence (OE) would like to thank internal partners Sharon Johnson, Selina Bohn, Travis Jansen, Kaitlyn

Pflieger, Pam Lowery, Samantha Duzak, Alan Pinkerton, Zar Matic for their work in getting these surveys completed.

OE is part of the Data Governance Steering Committee and we have submitted our initial Data Governance Policy to the ELC for approval. This work is vital to the safe, secure and unambiguous data operations of Gateway.

Gateway Industrial Design Fab Lab is no stranger to the arts. The Lab has spearheaded multiple cross discipline arts initiatives, such as "Digital Transitions New Tools new Art" with the Kenosha Public Museum in 2017, and regular participation with "gET bEHIND the aRTS", from 2017 through 2020. Gateway Industrial Design Fab Lab even hosted poetry events with both the Kenosha Poet Laureates and nationally recognized poetry organization "Bonk!" which held its final event last year. More recently, the Fab Lab is proud to be a part of Graphic Design, as the program relocated to iMET Center. This year was the third year the Lab participated in "Art 4 All" at Raymond School. Students generated fantasy animals in Tinkercad and then 3D printed them. There were two sessions, and just under thirty students participated – pushing their creative thresholds while experiencing CAD and being exposed to advanced manufacturing.









Foreign Exchange Students visit the Lab

Elaine Asma brought 23 foreign Exchange students to experience the Fab Lab. Students had an opportunity to run the 3D Printers and customized designs to engrave on tumblers. We look forward to them returning next month.

Home School Medical Prints Workshop

Home school students participated in a 3D printing workshop dedicated to medical studies. Students printed brains and hearts. The Lab showcases how additive manufacturing has permeated the medical and dental fields and kids got to see some 3D printed teeth, made as educational models for the dental assistants program.



Fab Lab visits Pathway High School Milwaukee

Gateway Industrial Design Fab Lab had an opportunity to visit Pathways High School in Milwaukee for its trimester project presentations. Pathways is a truly unique Charter School dedicated to project based learning and core skills. It uses a defense style final presentation instead of conventional grades.



The Lab also had a long overdue chance to visit Rockwell International Automation. Joseph Zacarria showed off the interior agriculture initiative.


NC3 Certifications


Intro to Manufacturing. Gateway Industrial Design Fab Lab looks forward to great fun and CNC at our next event!

Community and Government Relations

The spring continues to be a busy time of year as we engage in our communities in a variety of ways. We have been a part of meetings, board discussions, events with the Three Harbors Council, Boys and Girls Club of Kenosha, the Kenosha Public Library

Foundation, the local food banks, the United Ways of Racine and Kenosha counties and WCEDA plus many more!

We continue to work on branding and signage around the college. We have finished the new signage on the Racine campus and have begun the Kenosha Campus. Elkhorn will be starting soon.

The Wisconsin Women for Higher Education Leadership conference took place at UW Stout with wonderful speakers and good attendance.

We have started to work with TRANE on a few sustainability monitoring reports on our buildings. This will allow us to take a closer look at energy usage around our campuses.

The Center for Sustainable Living (CSL) continues to be busy with field trips and workshops. To date there have been about 750 visitors to the CSL.

Sixty-five (65) students have received assistance through the emergency grant program as of March 31, 2024. Thanks to a grant from the Wisconsin Technical College System to the College, \$7775 for rent, transportation, and utilities has been granted to 15 students.

Marketing

Final planning and preparations are taking place for the Kenosha and Elkhorn Celebrate Earth Day events that will be held on Saturday, April 20 on the Kenosha and Elkhorn Campuses. Work continues on the upgrade of Gateway's website Drupal 7 to Drupal 10. The web team is busy working on final review, troubleshooting and launch planning. This is a substantial and required upgrade to the college's web CMS that must be completed this year.

We are working to promote Summer semester enrollment including a registration push for continuing students as well as upcoming digital campaigns targeting non-returning students, prospects and guest students (area college students home for the summer).

WGTD

WGTD and Wisconsin Public Radio are busy getting the word out about pending changes in the two-network system that has served Wisconsinites and beyond for several decades. WGTD and its two Walworth County translators will become part of WPR's new news and talk network. Many things will stay the same but there will be additions, deletions and new options for listeners. The overarching goal is to better serve the public with the resources that are available. More information is at wgtd.org.

LEARNING INNOVATION DIVISION (Jeff Robshaw)

Information Systems

The implementation of Ellucian's / Campus Logic's Student Forms is in progress. Campus Logic was previously acquired by Ellucian. The first use of this product will be to provide the updated-for-2024 Financial Aid forms.

The integration between the Colleague ERP and the Brightspace LMS is now being used in production for 2024 Summer. At this time 2024 Summer student registrations are being sent. This integration will automate the sending of Students, Staff, Courses, and Enrollments from Colleague to Brightspace.

The implementation of eTranscripts is in progress. eTranscripts will allow students to request and transfer their transcripts digitally.

Information Systems is supporting the Moonshot for Equity project by providing requested reporting. The Colleague UI servers are being upgraded to a new OS and UI version.

Seven I.S. servers are being upgraded because their current Operating System is nearing end of support.

Information Technology

I am thrilled to report the completion of our network edge switch replacement projects and our Google Drive file migration project. These large scale projects took an extraordinary level of skill, teamwork, and coordination to complete with minimal disruption.

Our security team has been hard at work laying the foundation for our privileged access management system. Most of the groundwork has been completed and the team will start onboarding systems and accounts to secure access to these privileged credentials to further improve the college's cyber security posture.

After the Spring 2024 term is completed, we will begin deploying our new upgraded perimeter firewalls. We've experienced several periods of strain on the capacity and capabilities of existing firewalls and this hardware upgrade will provide us the additional resources and overhead required for our usage as well as provide us the capability to upgrade our Internet bandwidth. We are in the early stages of exploring the engineering and cost associated with upgrading our Internet handoff and bandwidth capabilities.

The IT team is working hand in hand with the Endpoint team to ensure our early Windows 11 deployments meet our network requirements and security standards.

End User Computing and Distance Learning

The CST's have completed about 75% of the IT program computer replacements. Once all the computers have been installed, we will work to transfer some of the dated equipment to the IT Program for students to use those computers in support of instructional activities. Students use these machines to learn to remove and replace components as well as learn to troubleshoot computers. At this same time, we will take the oldest IT equipment and make sure it goes through our disposal process.

The Distance Learning team has been continuing to work on making sure we are ready to roll out Brightspace for the Summer Semester. They have been working more and more with faculty to answer questions as we get closer to the roll out.

The Multimedia team has been working on room upgrade planning for this fiscal year. A large number of room upgrades are scheduled during the summer semester.

We have begun to receive equipment for the Haribo Hall multimedia upgrade. The timeline for that project is right on track. Target completion date of that project is going to be May 29th, 2024.

The Endpoint team has been working on preparing computers for the Engineering program, as the IT computers have been fully provisioned. They are also working with IT on our Windows 11 provisioning process and we will begin providing Windows 11 computers to staff and faculty in the very near future.

ENROLLMENT (Stacy Riley)

Spring enrollment remains positive 10.1% FTE. Year-to-date enrollment, including summer, fall, and spring is positive +7.0% FTE compared to this time last year. Additionally, student headcount year to date is positive +5.4%. Summer and fall priority registration opened on March 18. Currently Summer enrollment is positive 12.4% FTE and Fall enrollment positive 3.3% FTE compared to this time last year.

STUDENT AFFAIRS (Stacy Riley)

Admissions

The Admissions department saw an increase in both applications and document intake in March compared to February. The team processed 631 supplemental item documents in workflow in March (compared to 495 in February) and 877 applications and program modifications (compared to 683 in February). Investigation was done into the use of the "request to add a second program process' ' for students who wish to intentionally pursue a 2nd academic program prior to completion of a first. It was determined that the process is working appropriately and that approx 61% of requests

were approved. Those that were "denied" were truly those who did not meet minimum eligibility criteria or those who did not follow the process appropriately.

Since June 2021-Dec 2023:

537 Request to Add a Second Program forms have been submitted with 301 requests being approved.

New Student Specialist (NSS)

During the month of March, the NSS team was very busy helping incoming students with their applications as well as preparing the high school students to register for their Start College Now classes in April. The team hosted many appointments on campus, both in person and online or over Zoom, as well as their regularly scheduled visits to our local high school partners. They scheduled and hosted several Get Ready Application Workshops to allow groups of students to get assistance with their applications at the same time. The members of the NSS team also organized and, or participated in several events on and off campus. They hosted campus tours for individuals and for groups like the freshmen students at Big Foot High School. They hosted application workshops for Contract For Service Nursing Assistant classes at East Troy, Union Grove and St. Catherine's high schools. They did an ESL presentation at Park high school. The group also hosted large campus events like the African American Adult Empowerment Conference, Women In Manufacturing Expo at the iMET center, and the Explore Gateway event featuring Protective and Human Services programs at the Elkhorn campus. Off campus, members of the team represented the college at the Lake Geneva Community Career and Job fair, the College of Lake County Tech Campus college and career fair, and the annual Kenosha County Expo.

Financial Aid

The Financial Aid Office has been busy preparing for the 24-25 school year. Daily monitoring updates from Ellucian, Department of Education and NASFAA (National Association of Student Financial Aid Administrators) on the FAFSA and needed software updates. Team members have regularly attended webinars held by the Department of Education, the College Board and other entities that can help us to monitor and navigate the numerous changes. Busy preparing our system, working to understand our new StudentForms system, and communicating to students on our progress for the 24-25 year.

Student Finance Specialists (SFS)

During March, the SFS presented at the HS Counselors Lunch N Learn providing an update on the 24-25 FAFSA implementation. They also supported FAFSA Completion events at Burlington and Park High School. Team members have been preparing for

April Financial Literacy Month and the upcoming Community FAFSA event to be held this month. They have seen an increase in students requesting FAFSA assistance for the 24-25 school year.

Academic Advising

Advisors saw an increase in student appointments during the month of March with registration opening for the Summer and Fall 2024 terms. Prior to registration opening on March 18th, Advisors have been meeting with students to update or create new academic plans for new and continuing students.

Academic Advising Week was March 18th - 22nd. During this time Advisors hosted "Academic Advising Cookie Connection" tables on the Racine, Kenosha, Elkhorn and iMET campuses. Students were able to talk with an Advisor, learn more about our services and take a treat (cookies) and some advising swag. Students also were able to vote on the Academic Advisor of the Year award. The winner will be announced within the coming weeks.

<u>Career & Employment Services (CES)</u>

March has been an extremely active month for CES.
