"My wife and I have always had a soft spot in our hearts for technical colleges and their students," says Bruce.

Bruce graduated from Gateway Technical College in 1977 in Accounting and 1982 in Data Processing. Bruce also received Gateway's 2009 Distinguished Alumni Award.

Over the years, Bruce has remained steadfast in his commitment to helping others in the community and giving back to Gateway. He was instrumental in securing scholarship grants for Gateway students in other venues and volunteers his time to provide professional expertise to the college's Programmer Analyst program.

Bruce has also served as a Programmer Analyst Advisory Board member and chairperson of that board since 2002.

It was while at Gateway that Bruce realized his life's work, met his wife through a student competition – she attended Blackhawk Technical College – and has now come back to serve the college and its students through the Foundation and the Information Technology advisory board.

"Being connected to Gateway is a 40-year passion," says Bruce. "It's really the only college I've known.

"Gateway has always been good to me. I like the instructors. I like the classes. I like the students. I like how Gateway talks, about careers, students, the community, to me. It's been a relationship that's lasted more than 40 years."

The Promise of a Better Future

Gateway launched its Gateway Promise program in 2016 to provide tuition-free education up to six semesters for high school seniors who meet academic and economic criteria. The program helps students in the tri-county area realize their dreams of attending college and preparing for a career. The first group of students began their Gateway journey in Fall 2017, with several graduating already in Spring 2018.

Southeastern Wisconsin employers benefit from access to an increased pipeline of highly qualified employees with education and training essential for regional economic growth and prosperity. Generous community support of the Foundation's Gateway Promise Endowed Fund helps ensure this promise to the community can be kept for generations.

FOUNDATION HIGHLIGHTS OF 2017-18

• A generous gift from the Andis Foundation established the "The Cut Powered by Andis Corporation" laboratory and salon in Burlington for students in the Barber Technologist and Cosmetology associate degree programs. At "The Cut," students can hone their retail skills and their barbering or cosmetology craft.

INSPIRATION GRANTS AWARDED:

- > Developmental Doubletime: Lisa Kusko, Instructor Communication, to help students who have been identified in Developmental Education English courses as being ready for college level courses pay for a second Accuplacer placement test.
- > Accelerated Learning: Lisa Kusko, Instructor Communication, to help train Communication instructors in accelerated learning plans, a proven education technique to help students.

Ericka says their insight and background helps recipients to truly know how much they matter to the trio – and Gateway. "I remember, we started talking about how it would be great to start a scholarship for administrative professionals. We would be able to walk along with them. Not as a mentor, but to tell them that we were in your position at one point in our lives and we support you."

All three say they felt the same thing when they experienced the first student receiving a scholarship – pride and thanksgiving.

"I feel it in my heart," says Reyna. "I have been there. I know it's been a while, but it feels like it was yesterday. I see their eagerness to continue, and their pride."

"I had attended the ceremony in years past, too," says Elizabeth. "To hear the stories of the recipients, to know that you are helping someone here at the college to fulfill their dream is really touching. It's really such a little thing, to give, but it makes a large impact for someone else.

FOUNDATION HELPS EMT SO SHE CAN HELP OTHERS

Even though Raechel Liska viewed a college education as a "luxury," it was something she was determined to attain.

Raechel worked full-time as she worked toward her EMT Paramedic technical diploma but still needed an extra financial boost to help her with tuition. She applied to the Foundation – and was awarded two scholarships, the Joshua Dorval Memorial Scholarship and the Pierce Manufacturing HERO Center Scholarship.

She says the timing and financial benefits of the scholarships helped her to reach her goals.

"It was a relief. I was from a background that wasn't always lucrative, and paying bills and college tuition was hard. I viewed college as a luxury.

"When I received the scholarship, I was so grateful. It took the pressure off me – I wasn't under the pressure of how to come up with all the finances to pay for tuition. It allowed me to finish on time and be at a place where I could be successful.

Raechel finished on time in Summer of 2018 and already landed a full-time position at an area fire station before she graduated.



Raechel says she believes there was a benefit to receiving the scholarship that went beyond pure finances. She says the scholarship bolstered her commitment to do well in her courses and career because of the support others had given her.

"The scholarship gave me a sense of appreciation that someone else recognized what I was doing," she says. "Their willingness to help me meant a lot."

Raechel also spoke about her parents' willingness to help others, too, which connects with her current career.

"They put their lives on the line for others," she said at a Foundation event in early 2018. "They were willing to sacrifice their lives, which also meant sacrificing family time to answer the call for people who needed their help. "When I received the scholarship, I was so grateful. It took the pressure off me – I wasn't under the pressure of how to come up with all the finances to pay for tuition. It allowed me to finish on time and be at a place where I could be successful. "

"Through that, I realized we are all part of something much bigger than ourselves. I wanted to take part in that, and that's why I am an EMT. It's a beautiful thing."

Raechel knew she wanted to do this full-time, though, which meant training and college.

"College is something I've always wanted to do, I wanted to go so badly. I didn't always have the financial background to support those goals, so when the scholarships came in, it was breathtaking."
