# DUNCAN FAMILY ENDOWS SCHOLARSHIP FOR WALWORTH COUNTY RESIDENTS

Supporting students to pursue the life-changing benefits of an education has been a priority for LaVerne and Bill Duncan for much of their lives.

That support includes a strong commitment to Gateway Technical College students through the Gateway Technical College Foundation. Bill and LaVerne have been generous donors for many years and recently endowed a Foundation scholarship for students who live in Walworth County.

“We firmly believe in education at all different levels,” says LaVerne. “We are impressed by students who return to the classroom to increase their earning and career potential and being able to take care of their families.

“Taking that step to return to college isn’t an easy one, and we want to help them with an extra boost as they seek to better themselves and their career.”

Bill Duncan, who has served on the Gateway Technical College Board of Trustees for several years, said he and LaVerne were inspired to begin supporting the Foundation after seeing the effect a scholarship has for Gateway students.

Says Bill: “I hear stories from students and graduates all the time of how a Gateway education impacted their life. I see how an education can help students move up the economic ladder because of a new career. That degree has made a huge difference in their lives, and we wanted to be a part of that.”

LaVerne and Bill live in Walworth County and chose to endow a Gateway scholarship for those who live there. They chose to focus their scholarship on adult returning students.

“We wanted to show a preference to adults returning to college to improve their lives, not just students right out of high school,” says Bill. “There are many options available to those just out of high school, and not as many for those returning to college.”

LaVerne says that she hopes the scholarship may help those who had to leave college because of life circumstances, but need a little bit of financial support as they seek to finish those final few classes to earn their degree.

The Duncans chose to start an endowed scholarship because they had reached a point where they could provide a more substantial gift to the Foundation, says Bill. An endowment enabled them to have a long-lasting impact on students' lives.

"I love the idea of the scholarship, because we can continue to add to it over time," says Bill. "And, once it's established, it becomes self-perpetuating. The interest also pays for the scholarship moving forward. It will continue on."

LaVerne said it also becomes a legacy gift, as well as a focal point for other family members to support the college.

# SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENT SAYS STUDY ABROAD GAVE HER THE EXPERIENCE OF A LIFETIME

Karen Draper says she didn't choose Gateway's Human Services program – it chose her.

The Spring 2020 graduate says the Gateway Technical College Foundation has also had a great impact on her life.

“The scholarship encouraged me to strive even harder,” said Karen. “When you have a group of people who know the value of education and they give of themselves and their resources ... This is one of the most beautiful and selfless things a person can do for a student.

Karen received several scholarships from the Foundation, including the Freedom to Fly, Joseph E. Farnham and Gateway Centennial scholarships. The financial relief and help she received from the scholarships helped her to participate in the college's Study Abroad program. She says the experiences she had with it changed her perspective and will help her in her career and life.

# Draper served as Star Ambassador

It's important to me that I'm sensitive to all of these things, and interacting with people from different countries and Study Abroad gave me a unique opportunity to experience that."

Gateway's Study Abroad program connects students with program and career-related experiences in other countries, many times involving a project or working directly with people in that country.

"It's easy to interact and get along with people who have the same story as you, who are like you, but it can sometimes be uncomfortable when you're working with people who don't," says Karen. "I was able to see things and experience things I hadn't before, and being able to do so made me even more comfortable around people of all cultures."

Karen also said she was proud that she took the trip because she was the first in her family to embark on such an experience.

"To be able to go to another country and have the experiences I had is just amazing. I also felt proud because, as a Black student, I realize the participation in Study Abroad is low amongst students of color. When I went to Spain that year, I was the only Black student. That made me even more appreciative for the experience, and I hope I can encourage others to participate, as well."

In addition to being named a Foundation scholarship award winner and Gateway peer advocate among other noted links to Gateway, Karen Draper was also named the Racine Campus Star Ambassador in 2018.

Each of Gateway's three campuses have a Star Ambassador who is selected through a rigorous process, including an in-person speech and question-and-answer session. Nominees are selected based on their outstanding character, positive attitude, leadership, personal goals, communication skills, enthusiasm and self-confidence.

Star Ambassadors then serve as the student voice to the college and their communities for their respective campus.



# FOUNDATION HELPS SINGLE DAD, FAMILY MAN, REACH HIS CAREER GOALS



Nathanieal Pringle was a single dad trying to help out his children when he first decided to earn his GED at Gateway Technical College.

As he started to work on his GED, he took a look around at what else Gateway had to offer and realized how his career and life could benefit from an associate degree. After earning his GED, Nathanieal kept right on learning, all the way to earning an associate degree in Business.

Juggling all the finances to earn the degree wasn't easy, but Nathanieal knew that the education and training would pay dividends in his career and life. Midway through his educational journey, Nathanieal turned to the Gateway Technical College Foundation for help – and was selected to receive two scholarships.

“The scholarship was the extra financial piece that I needed, one more thing I didn't

have to juggle as I earned my degree,” said Nathaniel. “It was one thing I didn’t have to worry about, one less stress.

“It helped me out as a single dad, to begin with, then after getting married halfway through earning my degree. I was working, had a family and going to college at the same time. The scholarship helped out a lot.”

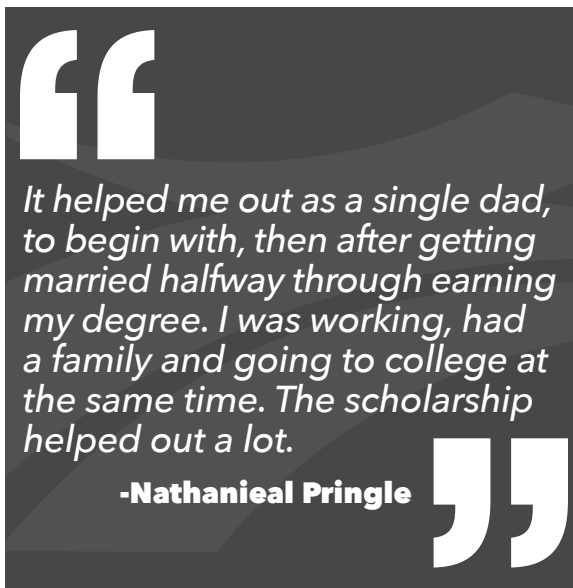
Nathaniel was awarded the Gateway Centennial Scholarship, started in the centennial year of the college in 2011. It is awarded to continuing students.

Nathaniel works as a contractor for a large corporation and says he uses the business management skills he gained at Gateway in his career. He continues to interact and give back to the college he graduated from now as a reader for Foundation scholarship applications. He says he gets great joy in doing this.

“I’ve felt that if there is anything I could do to help the Foundation, I would do that. (Executive Director) Jennifer (Charpentier) called me to say that they needed more readers, and could I help? I said yes.

“Now, I have the opportunity to read other people’s stories to see how they are seeking support from the Foundation – and this has been pretty special to me. I can relate to many of these stories.”

Nathaniel says he owes a lot to Gateway, the experiences he had there, the instructors and the Foundation.



“The college gave me those building blocks to have that confidence when I go into an interview seeking a higher career position. I owe that to Gateway – they gave me something I couldn’t find elsewhere.

“As far as the Foundation, I would tell folks who donate that there are so many diamonds in the rough that they support. You never know what that

With all the uncertainties in our daily lives, you and I know for our community to thrive, education remains vital. I am grateful for your support.

One of the delights many of our donors experience is hearing from students directly. Whether it is a handwritten thank you note or seeing a student speak, you can see the difference you made in another person's life.

Imagine you are a student and you are living on a shoe-string. And then life happens. Your car breaks down. You lose your job. Your family member who has been providing child care for your son or daughter falls ill and can no longer take care of your child. Your spouse loses her or his job and you need to work more hours. What if you could get back on track? Gateway Foundation is partnering with Gateway Technical College for the Fresh Start to Finish Grant pilot. The pilot grant program will allow qualified students to finish their programs by paying a portion of the debt over three semesters if the student persists and succeeds.

Whether it is the mission of the Foundation, a scholarship, student emergency funds, or the new Fresh Start to Finish pilot, your support changes the lives of Gateway students forever. Thank you.

The program helps students in the tri-county area realize their dreams of attending college and preparing for a career. Thanks to outreach in the community and generous Foundation donors, the college has now hosted three cohorts and prepares to welcome its fourth.

# FOUNDATION HIGHLIGHTS OF 2019-20

- The Foundation hosted its first “Gateway Foundation Presents: Innovation Celebration” offering uniquely Gateway experiences. More than 150 donors joined us for the inaugural event with Centrisys and Johnson Financial providing lead event sponsorships at \$10,000 each.
- The college’s Fab Lab produced personal protective equipment to meet the community’s needs in the Spring of 2020 and the community responded with generous donations to help fund the equipment.
- The SC Johnson Company invested more than \$530,000 for the Highly Skilled Occupations for Professional Employment (HOPE) Grant to train more than 150 community members in high-demand occupations.
- Tim Mahone of the Mary Lou and Arthur F. Mahone Fund of the Kenosha Community Foundation announced the group’s continued support of Gateway through a \$10,000 endowed scholarship donation to the Gateway Technical College Foundation. The Mahone Fund made the announcement during an event dedicating the Arthur F. Mahone Jr. Student Atrium in the Science Building on the college’s Kenosha Campus.

# INSTRUCTOR BELIEVES IN THE POWER OF A SCHOLARSHIP TO CHANGE A LIFE

Gateway Technical College CNC instructor Kidia Burns believes in the power that a manufacturing career can have to change a life for the better, especially for women who choose to enter the field.

Kidia believes in it so much that she's not only set up one scholarship to support students in manufacturing – she's set up two. One supports students in manufacturing programs, and the second supports students specifically in Gateway's CNC programs.

“Students were telling me their stories about how they couldn't afford books or calculators or other expenses they had with the college. Sometimes if you are a CNC student, your employer will pay for your class, but not the other expenses. They were telling me stories about how they couldn't pay for gas, especially if they had to take a class in Elkhorn.

“Students asked me to create a scholarship

just for CNC students who were struggling to pay for these things. I just felt I needed to do that.”

Kidia says she likes the easy process to fund the two scholarships, a process where amounts are taken out of her check monthly. She says she's gotten great joy out of setting up the scholarships to help others.

“I love it. If I can help someone succeed and be successful, I don't care how much is taken out of my check. I tell my students all the time that while I get a paycheck from Gateway, I don't do this for the money. I do it for them.”

Kidia has a special place in her heart to encourage women to go into manufacturing. Her mom was a setup operator at a local manufacturer, and Kidia followed in her footsteps as a CNC operator for more than two decades. She says the career field offers good pay, good benefits and a good way of life – life-changing for some.



## **DAVID AND HELEN TYLER MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP**

Started in 2017 by Gateway instructor and alum Kidia Burns, the David and Helen Tyler Memorial Scholarship is for a student enrolled in the CNC Technician program.

## **WOMEN IN MANUFACTURING SCHOLARSHIP**

The Women in Manufacturing Scholarship was started in 2019 by Gateway instructor and alum Kidia Burns for women enrolled in Gateway's manufacturing programs.

“I see so many women working 12 hours a day, seven days a week, no benefits, no nothing. I want the ladies to know they can make a good living working 40 hours a week in manufacturing, CNC, welding, robotics, or advanced manufacturing.

“You can make good money in those non-traditional fields for women, and Gateway can help you to get there – and I hope my scholarship will help some to reach that goal, too.”



## New Fresh Start to Finish program helps students return

The Fresh Start to Finish continues to draw interest from students.

The program, set up by Gateway Technical College in partnership with the Foundation, provides students who have debt with Gateway a way to handle that and return to the life-changing benefits of a degree.

Life barriers such as issues with transportation, childcare or very tight budgets may have caused the student to drop a class. Because of the timing of the drop, the student may have left Gateway owing the college money.

Students who have a past-due amount to Gateway of more than \$200, meet academic criteria and want to return to the college are eligible for the program. The average past-due amount for students is \$600. Many times, the amount owed is more than the student can pay back, yet they are unable to enroll for classes at Gateway with a past-due amount on their record.

This program aims to increase access and degree completion for students re-entering the college who have prior debts. Fresh Start

to Finish helps reduce the financial barrier by providing offsetting grants to forgive up to \$1,500 in unpaid prior student debt owed to Gateway. The debt is repaid over three semesters, while students must successfully complete each semester and maintain at least a cumulative 2.0 grade point average.

## Student emergency fund requests rise

The Foundation has seen the number of student emergency fund requests double this year compared to recent years.

Much of the increase can be attributed to the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on the lives of students and society.

The Foundation has been able to fill those requests. The grant focuses on helping students who've experienced an unexpected event or impact in their lives — and who might otherwise drop out of college because they can't make financial ends meet. Realizing how important it is for students to remain in college to gain those skills to a solid career, the one-time emergency grant will cover such expenses as books, gas for their vehicle, transportation or rent.





## Promise 2 Finish to help adult learners

Community members asked for this – and we heard you!

Many Foundation members asked for a program that specifically supports adult learners — age 23 and older — with their college finance and support needs. The result is the Promise 2 Finish program, which has continued to take in applicants. The deadline to apply was pushed back to Nov. 1 to accommodate applicants.

Promise 2 Finish provides adults who have earned 12 or more college credits and have been out of college for at least two years the opportunity to finish their degree tuition-free. Potential students must be at least age 23 or older by Jan. 1, 2020.

# AFTER 15 YEARS, FOUNDATION CHAMPION STILL FINDS REWARDS IN SERVICE AND GENEROSITY

Longtime Gateway Foundation donor and champion Jody Hart has watched the organization grow and blossom over the years as it supports Gateway and its students.

In reality, Jody's done more than just watch. She has helped the Foundation grow, nurturing it through the support of hard work and a scholarship she helped create.

Jody started helping out with the Foundation 15 years ago and continues to do so to this day. She began by helping with the annual golf outing and has worked on several of the Foundation's committees, including co-chairing the annual golf event committee for the past eight years.

"I've seen the college make so many strides in the right direction," says Jody. "I just felt that that is something I want to focus my

time and effort on, to help raise funds to support students to be successful. It's something I enjoy."

Jody has worked extensively with the college for many years in her professional role and serves on its Interior Design advisory committee. That relationship led her to help create the Complete Office of Wisconsin Interior Design Scholarship for Interior Design students.

"I work with interior designers daily in my job selling commercial office furniture. I see the value of education," she says. "I thought at the time that this was a great way to give back to Gateway."

Jody approached the owner of the company with the idea, he agreed, and the scholarship was established.

"There is nothing better than to be at the scholarship awards ceremony and shake the hands of the scholarship recipients," says Jody. "One gave me the biggest hug and started crying and said, 'You don't know how much this means to me.'"

"I just love doing this."
