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SC JOHNSON DONATION BRINGS HOPE TO THOSE AFFECTED BY PANDEMIC

The coronavirus pandemic has impacted many people this year as their lives changed abruptly in March.

For some, that meant the loss of their jobs. SC Johnson saw that need, though, and has donated \$539,660 to the Gateway Technical College Foundation to support Gateway in providing the skills and training for students to earn a workforce certificate. The program is expected to have an annual economic impact of \$5 million on Racine County.

The contribution will support the HOPE program – Highly Skilled Occupations for Professional Employment. The program is dedicated to helping dislocated workers regain the skills necessary to compete for jobs in career paths such as construction, advanced manufacturing, information technology and health sciences.

"A critical barrier to employment and career advancement is the lack of technical skills needed to succeed in the workforce. We are grateful for the generosity and support provided by SC Johnson to embrace hope and opportunity for our entire Gateway community," said Gateway Technical College President and CEO Bryan Albrecht.

"Gateway's program goes beyond job training and equips students with the tools they need to succeed after graduation by connecting them to career guidance and job placement," said Fisk Johnson, chairman and CEO of SC Johnson. "We hope this investment from SC Johnson will help Gateway break down barriers to employment and make a long-term positive impact on our community."

The HOPE training program provides funding for tuition, fees, industry credentials and job placement services. It will support 156 students to earn the certificates.

LaShon Stevens knew his work history and skills made him employable, yet he found himself on the hunt for a position months after a layoff that had sidelined him and his coworkers alike.

He knew he needed more education to get back into a career and decided to enroll at Gateway Technical College.

His journey to enroll at Gateway and complete his degree is filled with moments of self-realization – including a focus to help others in the city he loves and calls home.

It's also one that was fueled by the Gateway Technical College Foundation. LaShon was awarded the Alfred & Bernice DeSimone Endowed Scholarship in 2018 and the To The Finish Line Scholarship in 2019.

"The scholarships helped me and help others," says LaShon. "I think it helps to increase that awareness in the community that there is hope because of the scholarships.

LaShon's first program he enrolled in at Gateway was the Facilities Maintenance program because it was an area he was familiar with and something he enjoyed.

A few classes into his college education, LaShon realized what he really wanted – to open his own business. A few classes into that and he had another vision – he wanted his business to provide hope in Racine.

"I realized while I was in the Facilities Maintenance program that my real passion was to rehab houses and open my own business to do that, as well as property maintenance.

"This has morphed a few times over the years. I have a passion for people and believe rehabbing homes will help others. My ultimate goal is to help others to re-enter the community by working side-by-side with them to rehab their own home."

LaShon earned his Business Management associate degree in Spring 2020 and looks forward to his career – and helping others. He said that he believes the Foundation inspires so much hope in others that he would like to create his own endowed scholarship some day.

The Albrecht Family Scholarship was established by Gateway President Bryan Albrecht and his wife, Lisa, in 2014 for students active in student activities at Gateway.

"These scholarships have helped me to continue my education here at Gateway, and I want to thank those who've donated to them. I love the college and can't wait to go back on campus to see everyone in person. I love it here," says Megan.

Megan's presence has been felt nationally, too. She was named to the Campus Compact 2020-21 cohort of Newman Civic Fellows. Students selected for the fellowship are leaders on their campuses who demonstrate a commitment to finding solutions for challenges facing communities locally, nationally and internationally. Megan is the first Gateway student to be named a fellow.

The Professional Communications student was named as the college's 2020-21 District Ambassador and, as such, is the voice of the students to the college and community as well as serving as the student representative on the Gateway Board of Trustees.

"I heard about the Campus Ambassador position a year ago. I wanted to apply for it, but didn't think I could do it. Well, one thing led to another, I became a United Student Government officer, a peer advocate and decided to try for it. I still sort of am in shock that I was named ambassador.



MORGRIDGE CONTRIBUTION HELPS FUEL PPE FOR FRONTLINE HEALTH CARE, EMERGENCY RESPONSE WORKERS

Gateway Technical College's Industrial Design Fab Lab staff members have been busy testing, modifying and producing equipment used by first responders and others on the front lines of fighting the Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic.

Fab Lab staff members John Zehren and Adam Reed moved 3D printing machines and materials to two alternate locations just as the college shut its buildings in March and have stayed busy since then by designing and testing personal protective equipment (PPE) products.

Fueled by a Morgridge Family Foundation grant, they've produced masks, ear savers and face shields for first responders from throughout Southeastern Wisconsin.



"In this time of national crisis, we need to come together to do what we can for our local community." said Matt Janisin, vice president, Gateway Business and Workforce Solutions. "We have the talent, the resources and products to help emergency responders, and we are doing what we can to see specifically in what areas we might be able to support them."

Zehren, Fab Lab coordinator, and Reed, Fab Lab technician, started their work in late February on two project designs, a mask and face shield, which are being looked at by health care officials to see whether they can be used during this emergency. They continue with their design work on those pieces.

Zehren and Reed have produced and delivered 272 masks, 1,128 face shields and 12,655 ear savers to be used by area first responders and front line health care workers. Thanks to generous donors, this totals more than 14,055 pieces of PPE equipment that has been deployed to help our community.

DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI DOUBLES HIS CONNECTIONS TO COLLEGE





In this double-double year of 2020 for graduates, it seems natural that Roger Zacharias be named as Gateway Technical College's 2020 Distinguished Alumni.

Roger has two very distinct connections to the college, both showing his progression to leadership as a student and then as a professional in his career.

Roger began his career in Gateway's carpentry apprenticeship program, and it's one he's built over the years to include nearly all aspects of the industry, from swinging a hammer himself to representing hundreds of carpenters who work on projects throughout Southeastern Wisconsin.

His connection to Gateway doesn't end there – Roger returned 14 years later to the same college he graduated from to serve as a Board of Trustees member. He's served the board for the past 16 years, including president in 2007-08 and again in 2010-12.

"The training I received at Gateway gave me the skills to be a good journeyman carpenter," says Roger. "Being on the board has helped me to grow my leadership capabilities, whether I am serving on the board as a trustee, chairman or vice chairman."

Roger began his educational journey in August 1987 by starting his apprenticeship courses at Gateway. "I liked working with my hands and working with wood," says Roger.

After entering his career as a union carpenter, Roger then started running jobs until he became the business representative for Racine County and Kenosha County union carpenters, a position he's held since 2002 in varying degrees.

He was urged to apply for the Gateway Board of Trustees from a cross-section of trade union members. "It's an honor to know that you are part of that success and the success of the college, our communities and our business partners."

Roger notes that he has been helped in his educational and career journey by his wife, Barb, and their two children, Charles and Samantha.
