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Where's the Property Line?

Walking through a dense forest looking for evidence of a boundary line can be like seeing a ghost; sometimes you think you saw something, but in the end it's not there. Vanishing boundary lines were what the Caledonia Conservancy was facing when they purchased a 15-acre tract near Five Mile and Short Road. The Caledonia Conservancy is non-profit organization in the Village of Caledonia committed to preserving land for green space, for outdoor activities, and for educational purposes.

Sandy DeWalt, Vice President of the Conservancy, contacted Gateway's Land Survey Club with the challenge of revealing the hidden lines of the conservancy's new wooded property.

Upon several reconnaissance and fact finding trips to the new property, the Gateway Land Surveying Club determined that several of the new property boundary corners were missing and that to find those corners would mean locating the distant outside boundary framework of the property, the township section corners. To do that, the Gateway Land Surveying Club used extremely accurate Survey Grade GPS.

Today's surveying and geomatics industry demands people who can deal with multiple technologies (GPS, GIS, Lidar, robotic total stations, CADD), take initiative, work independently yet get along well with others, and work comfortably at a desk and in the field, all while managing complex projects.

It's not all about technology. It's also about being enough of a detective to know what evidence to gather to complete the story. "Revealing a boundary line can be like working a jig saw puzzle," said Jennifer Brennecka, President of the Land Surveying Club. "To know where to put the missing center pieces, sometimes you have to start with the outside border."

Truth is stranger than Fiction! Best used toward the middle and end of a course, this exercise has students divided into groups of no more than three. Faculty ask students to write the most unusual story that happened to them during their service learning experience and to be prepared to share it with their small group at the

next class session.

At the next class, have students share their stories in small groups and then come together as a class. Ask representative group members to share some of the stories and what it meant to group members. Open up the discussion to the rest of the class.

Faculty should be prepared to prompt students if needed.

Students learn valuable writing skills, group communications skills, and have the chance to explore what situations/knowledge affects them.

With student permission, faculty can collect stories and send them to the Service Learning Center.
