Kenosha—February 19th saw the return of an annual event displaying a partnership between five departments and the Boys and Girls Club of Kenosha.

This year, students from the Surgical Tech, Dental Assistants, Nursing, Cosmetology, and Criminal Justice departments led a series of workshops for the 100+ students revolving around health and wellness.

Nursing students held a series of mini-workshops on nutrition, healthy habits, and exercise.

Dental Assistant students worked together with volunteer dentists to provide dental screenings, and explained the importance of flossing and keeping teeth clean.

Surgical Tech students went in depth on the importance of personal hygiene.

Cosmetology focused on nail care and students did some beautiful nail art for students.

Criminal Justice students partnered with the Kenosha Police Department to bring in the Canine Unit to explain how the dogs are trained, what the dogs are used for, and the importance of good training.

Over all, it was a great experience that both the attending students from the Boys and Girls Club and Gateway's students felt the event was positive, enjoyable, and—most importantly—fun!

Service Learning Course Design Workshop

Since August of 2012, the Service Learning Center has facilitated 4 separate Service Learning Course Design Workshops for faculty.

This workshop focuses on preparing faculty to integrate service learning into their existing course work, to

teach the Serving to Learn Locally class, or to teach an international service learning trip.

Held once a semester, this workshop addresses the ins and outs of creating a productive service learning project in your existing course.

So far, 30 instructors—both full time and adjuncts-have completed this workshop. Adjunct instructors can qualify for a \$100 stipend while full-time instructors receive re-certification credit.

Serving to Learn Locally is a 2credit elective that has been designed as a community foWe are recruiting instructors to teach in Fall. cused class enabling students to create their own service learning project related to their own interests and career field. As it focuses on the project, stu-

dents are expected to complete 36 hours of service in the community or at an agency site.

In the past, this class has only been offered once a semester. However, starting in the fall of 2013, we will be offering it for the entire semester on each main campus (Elkhorn, Racine, and Kenosha).

If you are an instructor who already utilizes service learning or are interested in utilizing service learning as a teaching tool in your class, this is a great opportunity to get your students involved outside of the classroom.

Community Partner: How To's

From a faculty's perspective, just how does one go about initiating that first community partnership? There are three popular ways!

First, faculty have access to assistance from the Service Learning Center. Over three years worth of data have been collected in a database of exist-

ing partnerships, community partners who are looking for new partnerships, and agencies yet to be approached. For access to needs specific to your discipline, please contact Madeline Carrera carreram@gtc.edu

Second, faculty are encouraged to go out and make those connections themselves. Yes, some

of the community partners in the area don't know about Service Learning yet, but that is no reason not to talk about it!

Last, talk with your colleagues. Many of our faculty are already engaged in service learning. Test the waters. Ask around! You'd be surprised who is already engaged.

Reflection Activity: Quotes in Song

Faculty can use this variation on quotes throughout the course. Students find a song in which the singer uses lyrics that describe their thoughts about the service experience. Students may find a whole song or only partial lyrics. If students have access to the song, have them

play it at the end of a reflection session, after students have explained why these lyrics relate to their service experience. If students prefer to write their own lyrics for a song, allow this as an option. The class session in which these songs are "performed" usually has a fes-

tive atmosphere.

Faculty may want to provide "concert souvenirs" or don concert wear to contribute to the spirit of the sessions.
