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Horizon Center Advances

Gateway's Horizon Center for Transportation Technology will open for the Fall Semester, with a Grand Opening / Open House planned for September 20.

Horizon Center is a community venture to support the advancement of transportation—vehicular and aeronautic —technology training in southeastern Wisconsin. Horizon Center is garnering the support of major automotiverelated industry such as Snap-on Incorporated, a primary partner in this training effort. Over \$1.5 million has been generated in community support from companies and individuals. They are supporting equipment, furniture, and student scholarships. Companies range from automotive equipment manufacturers, automotive dealers, and individuals and organizations concerned with ensuring that a skilled technician workforce is available in Southeastern Wisconsin.

The Horizon Center will serve the most advanced of high school and college automotive students. It will feature the first Snap-on diagnostic tool certification program in the country. The Gateway associate degree automotive program will become year-round, six days a week, 7a.m.-10:00 p.m. The service area will mimic that of an actual service center—from customer service technician through repair.

Gateway Hosts First System-Wide Robotics Challenge and Fourth Annual High School Competition —Engineering Tech moves to CATI

Gateway hosted the first Wisconsin Technical College System (WTCS) Robotics Challenge to be held system-wide. Eleven teams from seven Wisconsin Technical Colleges journeyed to Gateway Technical College's Center for Advanced Technology and Innovation (CATI), Sturtevant, Saturday April 28

Each college team competed in three events: a design presentation, design documentation, and a timed event. This is expected to become an annual event.

The Wisconsin Technical College System-wide challenge began as a Gateway District event sponsored for middle and high school students from throughout the district. It is sponsored by the Gateway Technical College Engineering Tech Wing. This year's middle and high school event was held at CATI May 17.

Gateway offers the following engineering technology associate degrees: **Civil Engineering Technology** (Architectural/Structural, Public Works, Surveying), **Electrical Engineering Technology** (Electrical Engineering Technology, Electronics), **Mechanical Engineering Technology** (including Mechatronics) and an advanced technical certificate in **Telecommunications**. All engineering technology courses will be moving to CATI in Fall 2007.

The move will allow for advanced technology lab space and will be more accessible to businesses in the Renaissance Business Park for cooperative projects or skill upgrade training. Several agreements exist between Gateway and Milwaukee School of Engineering and Marquette University's engineering program that allow Gateway engineering technology graduates to transfer credits into their four-year bachelor degree engineering programs with sophomore or junior standing. These agreements offer many benefits to the engineering bachelor's degree seeker:

- Study locally for the first couple of years
- Save tuition money on a 4-year engineering degree
- Gain engineering technology career skills so one can work in industry while finishing bachelor's degree

Industry Leader Donations Vastly Expand Gateway's Telecommunications Instructional Capabilities

On April 17, they formally announced their partnership with Gateway Technical College, which will serve as the company's Midwest training center for its client base. Gateway instructor Randy Reusser, through the college's Workforce and Economic Development Division, will teach new and existing users of Belden products how to work with the latest and most cutting-edge products.

It also benefits area telecommunications companies who require customized training for their workforce to keep pace with ever-changing technology.

Only 65 trainers have been certified by Belden in the world—Gateway's Reusser is one of those. "We have invested in Mr. Reusser because of his background as well as his enthusiasm," says Guylaine Boisvert, manager of Belden Training, Technical Support & Certification. "Client satisfaction requires us to make sure they have the best understanding of our product features and proper usage. Training is the key."

The cutting-edge Belden technology will constantly be updated so its Midwest clients have access to it for both training and potential purchase. This same equipment will be available to Gateway Technical College telecommunications students, along with other brands and configurations. Reusser will teach traditional Gateway

The event was held at Gateway Technical College's Racine Campus Conference Center, 1001 S. Main Street. Jessica Doyle, wife of Governor Jim Doyle, addressed students and explained the importance of looking to the future and how her husband, the Governor of Wisconsin, is trying to partner with them.

The Wisconsin Covenant is a Governor Doyle initiative, in conjunction with Wisconsin higher education institutions—both public and private, to guarantee those who sign the Covenant as an eighth grader a place at their college if certain requirements of the Covenant are met. The eighth graders pledge to earn a high school diploma, maintain a "B" average, and participate in their communities.

The students also attended three career and education presentations prior to Jessica Doyle's presentation and the ceremonial signing—one on engineering, another on emergency medical services, and another on barber/cosmetology.

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Gateway Increases its efforts in Strengthening Math and Science

Gateway is part of a national effort to integrate and strengthen Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM) education. Because of the College's earlier efforts, Gateway president Bryan Albrecht was asked last year to present at a prestigious U.S. Department of Education summit on improving math and science education among young women. Gateway's initiatives in the areas of science, technology engineering, and math continue.

- Gateway is currently participating in the Southeast Wisconsin STEM initiative to advance regional partnerships promoting education and business partnerships through science, technology, engineering, and mathematics.
- Gateway will be hosting regional focus group sessions to gather input from the community on advanced education needs in the STEM area.
- In partnership with UW-Parkside, UW-Whitewater and Carthage, a teacher education conference on STEM initiatives to strengthen the programming opportunities in Southeast Wisconsin is being planned for the upcoming academic year.

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MSSC Certification

Five students who recently completed Gateway's second Welding Boot Camp are among the first in the country to achieve Manufacturing Skills Standards Council (MSSC) certification in Safety.

Gateway is one of the first educational institutions in the country to have been nominated as a national MSSC assessment and certification site. The MSSC has become a nationally recognized certification indicating to employers that individuals who pass their certification have documentable and transferable skills in one of four areas of manufacturing concern.

The five students—Robin Koeller, Andrew Reimann, Renee Preston, Kathy Veto, and Joshua House—passed the Safety MSSC exam as a capstone of their 8-week welding bootcamp experience. This certification shows that those who passed meet the standard set by hundreds of large corporations across the country. It is a signal to potential employers that these individuals come to them with competencies that other candidates do not.

Gateway is taking a leadership position among educational institutions by integrating these new MSSC certification exams into their career training programs. Gateway incorporates all four exam areas into its Automated Manufacturing Systems program and one or more of the MSSC tests into the Welding and CNC Boot Camp programs.

Gateway Board to Hold Annual Budget Public Hearing

On June 11, Gateway will be holding its public hearing for the FY 2008 budget. Our goal throughout the budget process is to position the college for growth, in alignment with Gateway's Vision 2012—a strategic planning effort designed to guide Gateway's growth and direction over the next several years. The budget includes new positions to support distance learning initiatives, new program and curriculum development, and expanded educational offerings.

The budget process challenged the board and administration to establish a plan which keeps spending in line with anticipated revenues. As a result, Gateway will be holding the line on spending; operating expenses are budgeted to increase by only 3% next year and the budget includes a modest 4% increase in our tax levy. Gateway's tax levies and rates are consistently below the average of the other technical colleges. The budget to be presented on June 11 reflects a fiscal policy that is responsive to the taxpayers and provides expanding quality training and educational services for district residents.

The budget hearing will be held June 11 on the Kenosha campus. A presentation of the College's FY 2008 financial plan will be made and citizens' comments will be invited.
