As a freshman, Szaky left Princeton University to found TerraCycle, building a company that has doubled in size every year since inception becoming the 233rd fastest growing company in America.

Lab to benefit Surgical Technology and Dental Assistant students

A project will be completed by the end of summer which will provide Surgical Technology and Dental Assistant students with an expanded lab setting as well as adding newer equipment that mimics the working environment in which our graduates will enter.

The project calls for expanding our Surgical Technology and Dental Assistant labs in the Science Building on the Kenosha Campus. Space was freed up for the remodeling when biology classes shifted from being held in rooms next to the labs over to another building.

The renovation will accommodate more students, giving an added number access to training in the two programs. Equipment upgrades include adding digital radiography capability to the dental assistant lab and laproscopic surgical suites becoming part of the new Surgical Technician lab/operating room environment.

Health occupations such as dental assistant, surgical technology and nursing are high growth/high demand occupations within southeast Wisconsin, and these programs are vital to meeting the healthcare workforce needs of the state. Funding for the project comes from the federal budget as a result of the work of Senator Herb Kohl.

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AITP does well at national competition

FastTrac entrepreneurial training program begins

Gateway Technical College has redeveloped an Entrepreneurship Certificate program to shift its business planning curriculum to the nationally recognized Kauffman FastTrac training – allowing it to partner with a four-county, three-year training program and allowing students who enroll in the program through Gateway access to free books and materials.

The Walworth County Economic Development Corporation (WCEDA) partnered with Gateway and several others to help offer the entrepreneurship training program FastTrac, which has begun providing opportunities for entrepreneurs on Gateway's Elkhorn Campus and will begin offering courses on Gateway's Kenosha Campus in June.

The program offers opportunities for graduates by preparing them to operate their own business. They will receive training in such areas as business feasibility, new venture planning and operations management which will take them from knowing whether they should embark upon the life of an entrepreneur – to planning how to handle day-to-day operations. New courses have also been developed for the current business owner to evaluate and grow their business in today's challenging business environment.

WCEDA and its partners received a \$687,100 grant from the U.S. Department of Commerce – Economic Development Administration to cover about two-third of the program over three years. Part of that funding includes free books and materials provided to students in the Gateway program.

AmeriCorps VISTA (Volunteers in Service to America) is a national service program in which full-time volunteers aged 18 and older live in the communities they serve, designing anti-poverty programs that will continue after they complete their service.

Working with its community partner, United Way of Racine County, Gateway's VISTA will work with community agencies to identify and expand opportunities for Gateway students and employees to assist in the agencies' anti-poverty activities. At the same time, the VISTA will work within Gateway to identify classes, clubs, and students or employees who wish to experience service learning. Then the VISTA will connect these Gateway resources to the community agencies.

To make this an even greater learning experience for students, a team of interns from Gateway's Biz Squad program will work with the VISTA to establish an Office of Student Civic Engagement at Gateway. Interns will create the office's identity, help write policies and procedures, and set up the infrastructure to maintain the service learning projects. The Biz Squad will also market the office's activities within Gateway and the community.

The host site application can be renewed for two additional years, so once the model is established, Gateway will expand its efforts into Kenosha and Walworth counties.
