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Horizon Center hosts statewide auto training

High school and college automotive instructors received training in automotive technology at the Team Wisconsin Summer Training Institute at Gateway's Horizon Center for Transportation Technology, Kenosha. The Foundation of the Wisconsin Automotive & Truck Dealers Association directed the institute, in place since 2000.

Much of the training focused on advanced automotive technologies, alternative fuel and advanced propulsion technologies, as well as curriculum development and delivery best practices. Training sessions for the four-day seminar included Snap-on training for students, advanced propulsion vehicles, diesel training, and seminars from representatives of individual manufacturers on the newest and most cutting-edge equipment and vehicles.

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Gateway hosts community auto clinic

Gateway Technical College held its first Gearheads Car Care Clinic, a free community seminar aimed at giving attendees the skills to perform basic car maintenance and safety procedures.

Attendees, women from the tri-county area, noted that they wanted to learn some level of vehicle maintenance skills so they could perform the procedures themselves or become more informed car and truck owners.

Gateway instructors provided attendees with the training to change oil, tires, fuses, and windshield wipers, as well as how to properly read their owner's manual, apply windshield protectorant, check fluid levels, and headlight procedures.
