A Year in Review

The 2020-2021 academic year has been a whirlwind of challenge, resiliency and upheaval that encouraged strength of character and community at Gateway Technical College that should be recognized. During this time, we also hosted several activities encouraging connection despite social distancing and working/learning from home. Here are some

- Drive-through donation drives: Food and hygiene items were dropped off at each campus and brought to local food pantries and homeless shelters.
- Volunteer "take out": Students made no-sew tie blankets which were donated to local homeless shelters and/or restocked local little free libraries with a provided bag of books.
- Virtual volunteering:
 - Smithsonian Museum transcription project.
 - Mapping Prejudice Project.
 - Crisis Text Line and 7-Cup Crisis lines.
 - Be My Eyes.

Other significant areas of engagement included:

- Students and staff cleaned up and handed out supplies during the cleanup efforts following civil unrest in Kenosha.
- CNC students organized a drive-through donation drive to send more than 1,100 nonperishable food supplies to the Racine County Food Bank.
- Veterinary Technician students provided care to local animal hospitals and shelters.
- Nursing students provided COVID-19 vaccines and service to elder care facilities, assisted living facilities, nursing homes, and hospitals.
- Accounting students partnered with the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) programs in Kenosha and Racine, helping complete taxes for individuals and families.
- Horticulture students provided information for growing food at home either in the yard, raised beds or via containers.





A Year in Review







Several classes had multiple projects:

- IT Project Management teams worked with the following organizations:
 - Elkhorn Area School District: Students conducted maintenance and cleaning on in-school technology.
 - Racine Zoo: Students created a plan for installing a kiosk for finding memorial bricks, trees and benches throughout the property.
 - Every Child's Place: Students created age-appropriate desktop set-up for kids.
 - Kenosha/Racine Poet Laureate Program: Students created a social media marketing plan and updated website formatting for ease of use.
- Rick Barribeau's Technical Writing students worked with a number of nonprofits this last academic year.
 - Three students secured grants totalling \$35,000 for local nonprofits.
 - Students developed materials including a brochure for the Kenosha Yacht Club's summer workshops, a letter of intent for Walkin' in My Shoes and letters of intent for Hawthorn Hollow.
 - A student built a website for Dementia Friendly Community Initiative (DFCI) as part of her internship.
- Joint efforts between classes and Habitat for Humanity of Kenosha helped support two new builds.
 - Bob Kaebisch's Architecture students designed blueprints for houses to be built in Kenosha. Two blueprints were selected to be built starting Spring 2021.
 - Aaron Schauer's Arboriculture class pruned and cleared out trees to prepare for groundbreaking and building efforts
 - Students from both projects have returned to help with the home building efforts despite their project ending.

Although it was a different year, we are proud of how our Gateway community came together.

Many of the interactions Megan had in this past year were focused on civic engagement. She was able to speak with legislators and leaders from around the country about a number of topics. She recruited volunteers and volunteered at polling places for the November election.

"Before I started the whole fellowship, I never saw doing anything public service related or anything political because it can be very dividing. But after this whole experience, I can definitely see myself running for school board or something," Megan said. "What I really took away from this is that there isn't just one way to lead. We can all lead in our own way."

Food for Thought 2.0 Gateway to Leadership Project

This year, a second Gateway to Leadership team (Lidia Hernandez-Guizar and Stephanie Cascio) revised the Food for Thought project to reflect what we've learned in the program's first four years. With COVID-19, the program shifted to offering digital gift cards rather than physical food. Taking this into consideration, the proposed changes included: continuing offering immediate digital gift cards through an online form; offering pop-up pantries where students can shop for food items during on-campus/in-person events; partnering with mobile food pantry programs to making Gateway a pick-up location; and working towards having on-campus food pantry services on each main campus.

We look forward to seeing how implementation of these expansions can address the food insecurity needs of our students. Thank you Lidia and Stephanie for all your hard work on this project!
