TechWizards at Gateway and Beyond

Hosted at Lincoln Middle School, these students utilized Lego Mindstorm NXT technology to host an after school robotics club with sixth through eighth grade students. This first year, the team led by IT students Donavan Groves and Annie Fahy took home first place at the tricounty 4-H TechWizards Robotics Rally at the CNH corporate training facility in Sturtevant.

The following school year, 2012-2013, Donavan Groves carried on with a new colleague, Mary O'Sullivan, and have expanded from just Lincoln Middle School to the Boys and Girls Club of Kenosha for summer robotics activities.

Now in their third and second years, respectively, Groves and O'Sullivan have built curriculum around the Lego Mindstorm NXT robotic program while



incorporating important features such as vocabulary lessons, individual and group activities, and other aspects of STEM-related skill building activities and games. Mary and Donavan focus on activities and games that teach the importance of delayed gratification, teamwork, exploration, collaboration, and selfmotivation.

STEM—Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics—is a nationwide focus for educators and administrators in all areas of education. Robotics, IT basics, and the career opportunities in STEM disciplines are main focuses of the TechWizards program.

Beginning this school year (2013-2014), TechWizards is proud to announce their expansion into Washington Middle School. Although this program only runs during the school year, through the innovations and tenacity of Mary and Donavan, students enrolled in programming at the Boys and Girls Club in Kenosha are able to participate throughout the summer months.

When asked how they view their experience, both Mary and Donavan said it was something of a mixture of volunteering, service learning and mentoring, and "so worth it," Mary says. "I learn just as much from them [the students] as they do from me."

"If we can inspire them with the basic knowledge [of technology and robotics], they can build upon it in the future," Donavan adds.

You Better Belize It!

In partnership with the nonprofit organization, Peacework, Gateway has made a long term commitment to assist the community of Orange Walk in Belize in its sustainable community building efforts. This service learning program is currently open to students in the Horticulture, Information Technology, and Nursing programs.

Applications for January 2015 are now available online.

January 2014—Eighteen stu-



dents joined three instructors on a ten day adventure to Orange Walk Town, Belize. Throughout their 10-day stay in Belize, the students broke into departmental groups aimed at tackling projects from their area of expertise.

Information Technology students worked at upgrading the technology infrastructure at local schools. They repaired hardware, updated software, and instructed staff at the schools how to maintain their devices.

Horticulture students collaborated with schools and community members to put in keyhole gardens, educate on sustainable practices, and brainstormed ways to integrate agriculture education into other areas of curriculum.



Nursing students spent time at local hospitals, rural clinics, and schools. They worked closely with the Drug Abuse Prevention Task Force on an initiative to educate and advise against marijuana use. This sparked BAM—Belize against Marijuana—a project to be continued throughout the upcoming years.

Their final presentation will be on February 21st at 6:00pm at the Madrigrano Auditorium.

Winter Wonders in Chicago

December 2013—Shortly before the semester ended, a group of students from Ann Vagnoni's suggested doing a project to expand their learning into the holiday season. Five students took it upon themselves to plan a supply drive of toiletries, snacks, gloves, clothes, and blankets for homeless individuals in Chicago. These students collected enough materials for 35 bags that were distributed on December 18th around Chicago. Each person who received a bag also received a bottle of water and sandwich. Any leftover items were then distributed to homeless shelters.

"I am very proud of these students," Ann Vagnoni said. "They suggested this project and took



time out of their busy holiday season to help the less fortunate."

Ann is looking at expanding this project throughout the regional area next holiday season.

Reflection Activity: Ethical Case Study

Faculty can require students to create a case study based on their experiences at their service site and use these case studies in the middle or at the end of the course. The case study should include a description of the context, the individuals involved, and the controvery or event that created an ethical dilemma. Students present their case study to the class and the class discusses the situation, giving reasons for their responses. Ethical case studies allow students to analyze a situation, practice ethical decision making as they choose a course of action, and explore and clarify values.

By having students present and discuss their situations and ethical dilemmas also encourages constructive problem solving, cognitive reflection, and collaborative communication skills.
